*Cultured Violence: Narrative, Social Suffering and Engendering Human Rights in Contemporary South Africa*. Liverpool and Scottsville: Liverpool UP; U of KwaZulu-Natal P, 2010. Postcolonialism across the Disciplines (Series editor: Graham Huggan, Leeds University). *Text deals extensively with the relations between hypermasculinity, HIV/AIDS and gender-based violence, including rape, in conditions of neocolonialism and the intergenerational heritage of colonial racism. Noted in the The Year's Work in English Studies as "pathbreaking" (2012.91.1 advance access online): "Rosemary Jolly's path-breaking book, Cultured Violence: Narrative, Social Suffering, and Engendering Human Rights in Contemporary South Africa brings together literary-cultural studies and social activism, and also places discursive and phenomenological analysis of texts and society in dialogue. Reciprocity is one of the central features of her account of what is needed to engender (in both senses) human rights in South Africa. Her central concept of 'cultured violence' (also called 'entrenched' violence) is used to name and explain the 'remarkable gap between the constitutional provisions protecting human rights in contemporary South Africa, and the apparent lag effect' in the failure to extend those rights to 'vast numbers of the country's inhabitants' (p. 5).
